Please respect the fireworks ban

Happy Fourth of July Snohomish County.

I'm Chris Teofilak, one of the seven citizens elected to serve on South County Fire's Board of Commissioners. Our regional fire authority serves the cities of Brier, Edmonds, Lynnwood, Mountlake Terrace, and parts of unincorporated Snohomish County.

There is a big change regarding fireworks this year. As of Jan. 1, 2021, the use of consumer fireworks is banned in unincorporated areas of Southwest Snohomish County. With bans already in place in all the cities we serve, this change means fireworks use is now illegal in our entire service area.

Each Fourth of July, our firefighters respond to multiple fires and hand/eye injuries caused by fireworks. Just outside our area in Marysville, a 21-year-old man died from injuries sustained from a firework explosion last Fourth of July.

The drier the summer, the more severe the fires we respond to on the Fourth of July. Unfortunately, homes in our area have sustained major damage due to fires caused by fireworks. These fires typically occur during the night when families are asleep, which decreases the amount of time someone can safely exit a fire.

In November 2019, voters were asked if they wanted the Snohomish County Council to enact an ordinance prohibiting the discharge of consumer fireworks in the unincorporated urban growth areas of Snohomish County.

More than 59% of votes cast by residents of South County Fire favored a fireworks ban.

If you would like to remove the fireworks ban, please feel free to run for office of your local city or county council. Until then, the ban is in place so please respect the votes of your neighbors and your council members.

Fireworks use is banned in South County Fire's entire service area

Fireworks use is now banned in all of Southwest Snohomish County. This includes the entire South County Fire service area:

- · Unincorporated communities
- City of Brier
- · City of Edmonds
- City of Lynnwood
- City of Mountlake Terrace



Paying the price: Penalties & fines

The county and all cities in our service area have fines for discharging banned fireworks.

NEW THIS YEAR:

- In unincorporated areas of Southwest Snohomish County, there's a \$500 penalty for a civil infraction and the possibility of court-ordered restitution for any damages. Extra patrols will be out in this area.
- The City of Edmonds has increased penalties. First-time offenders now face a \$500 fine. A second-time offense can result in a misdemeanor criminal citation, a fine up to \$1,000 and potential jail time.



Reporting fireworks use concerns & complaints

Call 911 for all emergencies.

Call the Snohomish County 911 nonemergency number, 425-407-3999,

for complaints related to noise or illegal fireworks use with no threat to life or property.

When calling the non-emergency line, expect to be placed in a queue until a 911 dispatcher is available to answer your call. Dispatchers handle both 911 and non-emergency calls.

If you want to see fireworks this Fourth of July, please plan to attend a professional public display. It's the safest way to enjoy fireworks. Shows are being planned in Edmonds, Everett and Marysville.

Mobile vaccination clinics help reach our diverse community

Our mobile vaccination team, in partnership with the Snohomish County Vaccine Taskforce, continues to host community-based pop-up clinics as well as provide vaccinations for homebound residents. To date, the team has provided more than 6,000 vaccinations. This number does not reflect the tens of thousands vaccinated by South County Fire staff at the drive-thru clinics across the county.

Our outreach to our diverse service area has included pop-up clinics for the Spanish-speaking community at Silver Creek Church in Lynnwood; Ukrainian, Russian and Asian homebound residents at Mercy Housing in unincorporated north Lynnwood; the Islamic Center of Puget Sound in Lynnwood; and the Sikh Centre of Seattle in unincorporated Bothell.

We also participated in the Snohomish Health District's #VaxUpSnoCo social media campaign with videos from Firefighter Ivan Nunez in Spanish and Firefighter/Paramedic Boris Fayerberg in Russian.



We teamed up with the Korean Women's Association, Korean Community Service Center and the City of Lynnwood for two pop-up clinics at Northwest Church.





4 hazards: Steps to prevent summer fires at your home



HAZARD: Discarded cigarettes in vegetation, bark, mulch, potted plants, landscaping, peat moss, dried grass or leaves that could ignite easily. Every summer we respond to house fires that start this way.

PREVENT IT: Always use a deep, sturdy ashtray. Place it away from anything that can burn. Before you throw away butts and ashes, make sure they are out by dousing in water or sand.



HAZARD: Grills placed too close to your home, deck railing, trees or landscaping. July is the peak month for grill fires, according to the National Fire Protection Association.

PREVENT IT: Place your grill at least 3 feet from anything that can catch firesiding, deck railings, eaves, overhanging branches. Stay with the grill the entire time you're cooking. Clean your grill after every use.



HAZARD: Disposal of barbecue ashes or coals in a combustible container such as a plastic trash can or a cardboard box. Charcoal and ashes can smolder and retain heat – sometimes for days.

PREVENT IT: Place cool coals and ash from your barbecue in a metal container with a lid and place it well away from your home or anything that can burn.



HAZARD: Oily rags from your home improvement project left in a pile. Oilbased paints, stains and varnishes release heat as they dry. If oily rags are left in a pile, the heat is trapped, builds up and causes a fire.

PREVENT IT: Never leave rags in a pile. Put them in a tightly-sealed metal container with a lid and place it well away from your home or any other structure.

Following graduation from the rigorous 10-week fire academy, our new recruits participated in an Emergency Medical Service (EMS) Academy. All recruits are either emergency medical technicians or paramedics at the time they are hired. The EMS Academy focused on South County Fire policies, programs and protocols; hands-on training in our medic unit and its equipment; and clinical scenarios and hospital familiarization. For the final day, recruits were placed on a medic unit and radio dispatched to respond to EMS training scenarios all around our Headquarters campus.
